Equality Act 2010 claims: broad scope and remedy powers demonstrated in six decisions since July 2021:

- FTS/HEC/AC/21/0058: access to a school project involving a walk: claim dismissed.
- FTS/HEC/AC/21/0018: maths tuition during the pandemic; maths grade calculation; consultation with private tutor for estimated grade: claim dismissed.
- ASN D 20 09 2021: transition process to secondary school; process on application for deferral of a year's education; online teaching during the pandemic; nature of in-class learning support: claim dismissed.

Equality Act 2010 claims, cont'd

- ASN D 25 06 2021: use of private tutors; evidence externally produced work; predicted grades: claim dismissed.
- FTS/HEC/AC/21/0072-MERITS: exclusion of child and use of physical interventions: claim upheld, remedies on statement of discrimination, apology, training and policy review.
- FTS/HEC/AC/20/0088: early recognition of learning difficulties; diagnosis of dyslexia; differentiated support provision; standard of Gaelic reading and writing tuition; consideration of parental views on education; support during COVID 19 school closures.

Equality Act 2010 claims, cont'd

 Use of multiple forms of discrimination is common: reasonable adjustment duty, indirect discrimination, discrimination arising from disability.

Time-bar cases

- For references, the point has to be taken: rule 14(5)-(7) and rule 56 is it fair and just that the reference is permitted late? Similar to 'just and equitable'.
- For claims, the legal member or tribunal must take it: wording of rule 61(4) 'shall not consider a claim'.

Time-bar cases, cont'd

Three possible situations for time bar of claims:

- 1. The claim is lodged later than 6 months after 'the act complained of was done' where there is a single act/omission it is time barred unless it is just and equitable that the claim is considered although out of time.
- 2. The claim is lodged later than 6 months after the latest 'act complained of was done' where there is more than one act/omission representing 'conduct extending over a period'. Here, the 6 month period for lodging a claim starts from the date of the last act/omission. The just and equitable test applies to such a claim.
- 3. Where there is more than one act/omission but there was not 'conduct extending over a period', the just and equitable test applies to each act/omission which occurred more than 6 months before the claim was lodged.

Time-bar cases, cont'd

- Test used for 'just and equitable' is wide:
 - the discretion is wide and unfettered;
 - the absence (and presumably cogency) of an explanation for the lateness is relevant but not determinative;
 - key issues to be considered (alongside any others deemed relevant) are: the length of the delay, reasons for it and any prejudice suffered as a result ('forensic prejudice' is sometimes referred to);
 - procedural equal footing (overriding objective, rule 2(2)(c)) may be a relevant factor; and
 - the general rationales for having time-limit provisions should be considered.

Flexible Use of Case Types

- There continues to be claims under the Equality Act 2010 to seek remedies available under the Education (Additional Support for Learning)(Scotland) Act 2004 (2004 Act), including remedies in relation to coordinated support plans (CSPs) and placing request refusals.
- Indicator of the broad powers under the 2010 Act.
- Cases can run in tandem and hearings can be consolidated under the Tribunal rules.

Transition References

- Transition references are the least common of the four main case types, but they have been increasing in number: since the move into the First-tier Tribunal in January 2018, there have been 8 transition references, five have been lodged since April 2021.
- Relevant provisions: s.18(3)(g), s.12(5)-(6), s.13 and s.19(3) of the 2004 Act.
- The remedy in a transition reference is to require the respondent to take action to rectify any failure to comply with the transition planning duties: broad power, but must relate to the transition duties.
- 2004 Act Code of Practice contains practical guidance on the transition duties and regulations are in place: The Additional Support for Learning (Changes in School Education)(Scotland) Regulations 2005, SSI 2005/265.
